- Frequently use Mandarin as a social language in the class and with peers.
- You may have occasional assignments; e.g. composing Mandarin version of your own short writings which could be a poem or a simple story; sharing relevant information with the class on special holidays (e.g. Chinese New Year, Mid-Autumn Festival....etc).
